The Forest of Dean & Wye Valley region is looking forward to longer and hopefully drier days as we edge closer to Easter and the official start of Spring around the corner. There's a wide range of action packed fun filled events and activities to help families and friends alike find a sense of freedom as they explore the area's main drawcards; Forest of Dean, one of Britain's largest and most ancient forests, as well as miles and miles of winding rivers. The region offers something for every interest whether it is families hunting for dragon eggs and making Easter chocolates to getting lost in a hedge maze, or more active visitors discovering some of the area's best walking or biking trails, or even taking to the water by kayak. There's also the chance to witness a tidal wave race up the river as a four-star Severn Bore coincides with Easter this year.

Plus, there is still availability at a great range of accommodation providers from jazzy yurts on the slopes of viewpoints overlooking seven counties, to country cottages bordering ancient oak woodland.

The Great Easter Pottery Trail at Puzzlewood

Coleford, Forest of Dean, Gloucestershire, 6-17 April

This Easter, Puzzlewood will be visited by not just one, but a whole group of Easter bunnies as local pottery businesses in the Forest of Dean & Wye Valley have specially created ceramic rabbits that will be hidden within the 14 acres of magical woodland. The creations include a rabbit made by famed potter, Mary Rose Young, whose "Alice in Wonderland" styled work appears in the latest series of *The Great Pottery Throw Down*. Each day over Easter one of the rabbits will be hidden, and it will be up to eager explorers to hunt them down, snap a selfie and suggest a name, with a prize each day for the winning name.

Entry to Puzzlewood is £7 for adults, £6 for children aged three to 16 and children under two go free. A family ticket (two adults and two children) is available for £25. To find out more visit puzzlewood.net or call 01594 833187.

Hunt for dragon eggs at Goodrich Castle, Wye Valley Goodrich, Herefordshire, 4-19 April

Goodrich Castle has stood strong for centuries, even withstanding a siege during the Civil War, yet this Easter it faces a new threat as dragon eggs have been hidden within the grounds. It is up to young adventurers to crack the clues and track down the hidden eggs before they have a chance to hatch. Successful egg hunters will get a certificate and treats from Hotel Chocolat.

Get crafty and follow an egg trail to find the Gruffalo at the Dean Heritage Centre, Forest of Dean Soudley, Gloucestershire, 4-17 April

Head to the Dean Heritage Centre this Easter for the opportunity to go on an egg hunt around five acres of historic buildings and woodland, while discovering the rich history of the Forest of Dean through a series of interactive displays. There will also be family friendly craft activities available daily in the craft hut and a nature trail deep in to the woods to find the Gruffalo.

Younger children can enjoy the petting zoo, while teens let loose on the go-karts and bucking bronco. There will of course be top-quality horse racing throughout the afternoon which will be kickstarted with an exciting Shetland Pony race.

Witness a tidal wave race up the river with the Severn Bore

River Severn, Forest of Dean, Gloucestershire 8-11 April

Between 8-11 April, there is the opportunity to witness a unique natural phenomenon to this area of Britain when the River Severn's huge tidal range (the 2nd highest in the world) causes a surfable tidal wave known as a 'bore' to ride up the river. Due to peak as a 4-star rated wave on Good Friday (10 April), surfers, paddleboarders and kayakers will eagerly be heading out on to the water with hopes of catching the wave as it makes its way up to Gloucester.

The bore can be viewed from several places, with the best views at Minsterworth (parking available at St Peter's Church), alternatively head to Newnham or Broadoak. To check out the times visit www.severn-bore.co.uk

Walk through Gloucestershire's Golden Triangle

Throughout the Forest of Dean & Wye Valley

Easter is the ideal time to walk the circular 10-mile Daffodil Way in the Forest of Dean, which goes through Gloucestershire's 'golden triangle', woodland that is completely blanketed with wild daffodils during spring. There are also a wide variety of other day routes available through the Forest of Dean & Wye Valley, from a five-mile loop discovering forgotten industries to walks atop sheer limestone cliffs. There is also a collection of twelve easy walks that are relatively gentle, avoid stiles and are generally under two miles. These walks are ideal for young families or those that are less able. To view all twelve walks and download routes visit www.wyedeantourism.co.uk/12EasyWalks.

Get lost in the Amazing Hedge Puzzle and experience a tropical world at Wye Valley Butterfly Zoo Symonds Yat West, Herefordshire

Children can enjoy trying to hide from their parents (or vice versa) in this traditional labyrinthian hedge maze while racing their way to the 'Temple' at the centre. With everyone relocated and the exit found, why not head next door to the Wye Valley Butterfly Zoo to walk through a tropical world of exotic butterflies.

Spring into action on the Forest of Dean's network of cycling tracks with Pedalabikeaway Cannop, Forest of Dean, Gloucestershire

With over 40km of traffic-free interconnected cycle routes running throughout the Forest of Dean, it is the ideal place for a two-wheeled adventure. Cyclists of all ages and abilities can enjoy the gentle 11-mile circular family trail which passes several beauty spots. Whereas those looking to get the adrenaline flowing can take to the blue graded Verderer's trail for tricky turns and fast descents and

for a true challenge tackle the red Freeminer trail for killer climbs, jumps, rock gardens and hairpin bends.

Pedalabikeaway is the central hub for mountain biking in the forest and has bikes available to hire from £15 per half a day's hire. To book and find out more visit pedalabikeaway.co.uk or call 01594 729000.

Jazz themed Glamping at Mrs Mills' Yurts

May Hill, Gloucestershire

On the slopes of May Hill, a National Trust landmark which looks over seven counties, lies Mrs Mills Yurts, four luxurious yurts styled after the roaring 20s and the jazz age. Each yurt is kitted out with a wood burner, a kitchenette and cosy beds to sink into. Mrs Mills provides all guests with a welcome hamper packed full of local goodies and serves complimentary tea and treats daily in the snug. Climb up May Hill for breath taking views and great kite flying opportunities or take a short drive to reach key attractions in the Forest of Dean and along the River Wye.

Goodrich, Herefordshire

With a choice of eight self-catering apartments in a converted priory that originated in the 14th Century, Flanesford is a relaxed, rural escape in a picturesque location between Goodrich Castle and the banks of the River Wye. The modern apartments range from the cosy Kerne (sleeping two) right up to Talbot which sleeps ten in the original living quarters of the Augustinian Monks, complete with stone stairways and exposed beams. This Easter, guests can save up to 30% on stays and enjoy easy access to the River Wye, with a canoe launch just minutes away and riverside pubs dotted along the banks on both sides.

Family and dog friendly cottages at Deanwood Holidays, Forest of Dean

Yorkley, Gloucestershire

In a peaceful setting that borders an ancient oak woodland in the Forest of Dean, Deanwood Holidays is a community of 13 holiday cottages with plenty of space for both dogs and children to run around freely. Deanwood has direct access straight onto woodland footpaths and for families looking to get out on their bikes there is secure cycle storage in the bike shed, as well as maps available in each cottage which includes suggested bike routes. The cottages themselves are centred around a large courtyard with outdoor dining areas and range from one bedroom converted stables to larger cottages sleeping five with exposed beams and modern interiors.

Tudor Farmhouse is a stylish boutique hotel in the small village of Clearwell within the Forest of Dean that was originally a working farm dating back to the 13th Century but has now been lovingly converted with a choice of 20 luxurious bedrooms and suites. The hotel's restaurant sources as much of its ingredients as possible from local suppliers within a 20-mile radius and is handily located for exploring the surrounding ancient woodland, with Puzzlewood just a five-minute drive away and walking paths right out of the door.

Forest of Dean & Wye Valley Tourism is the official Destination Management Organisation representing the interests of almost 300 tourism related businesses spread across Gloucestershire, Monmouthshire and Herefordshire and is the only cross-border tourism association in the UK, spanning Wales and England.

The region includes the Forest of Dean, one of England's most ancient forests, as well as the Wye Valley designated an Area of Outstanding National Beauty.

Featuring as the location for major blockbusters including Star Wars, Harry Potter and in 2020, The Secret Garden, the area is no stranger to TV and film fame, most recently taking a starring role in the Netflix sensation Sex Education.

With over 20 million trees and hundreds of miles of river this is the perfect place to switch off and enjoy nature and find a true sense of freedom; to forest bathe, meander downstream in a kayak or SUP, explore new heights from tree top trails, or maybe spot a deer or two on a wildlife safari.

There are over 25 miles of graded biking trails including a dedicated family circuit and walkers will delight in the area's hiking routes including the Offa's Dyke and Wye Valley National Trails. The four mile Forest of Dean Sculpture Trail features artworks created to interpret the environment and the history of the landscape.

Other attractions include the ancient trees of Puzzlewood, the deep caverns of Clearwell Caves, the heritage railway at Dean Forest Railway and the majestic castles at Goodrich, Chepstow and Raglan with awe-inspiring views at every turn such as the dramatic sight of Tintern Abbey from the Devil's Pulpit above.

Within this unique landscape of forested hillsides, limestone gorges, waterfalls, rocky outcrops and unspoilt villages are some of Britain's best fishing opportunities, not to mention tidal surfing on the Severn Bore, a natural phenomenon coinciding with the full moon.

When it comes to eating out and shopping there are artisan producers aplenty, as well as delis, smokehouses, gastro pubs, farm shops, Michelin starred restaurants, stylish interior shops and local galleries. These are all within easy reach of boutique hotels, cosy cottages and quirky glampsites.

There are thirst quenching tipples to sample from award-winning vineyards, breweries, cider farms and gin distilleries and pretty market towns to explore such as Coleford, Abergavenny, Ross and Monmouth.

2020 sees the region celebrate the 250th anniversary of the birth of tourism in Britain when William Gilpin popularised the area with his 'Wye Tour' trips down the river from Ross on Wye to Chepstow, publishing what is now widely accepted as Britain's first tour guide.
